## Upcoming Exhibitions at the Institute for Contemporary Art at VCU

In September 2026, the Institute for Contemporary Art at VCU will present three powerful exhibitions by award-winning and critically acclaimed artists Tony Cokes, Cassi Namoda, and Diane Severin Nguyen. While distinct in their mediums and approaches, these artists' practices share compelling thematic similarities, particularly in their engagement with cultural memory, and the politics of representation. Each artist, in their own way, challenges viewers to critically engage with the information and imagery they consume, pushing beyond surface interpretations.

## **Tony Cokes**


Tony Cokes (b. 1956, Richmond, Virginia) creates politically resonant works in a visual language all his own. Cokes was named a John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation Fellow in 2024. His exhibition at the ICA marks the artist's homecoming to Richmond and VCU's School of the Arts, where he received a master of fine arts in sculpture in 1985. Curated by ICA Senior Curator and Director of Curatorial Affairs Amber Esseiva, Cokes' exhibition will explore questions of artistry and personhood, touching on themes such as means of artistic production, intent, and the formation of personal identity.

Since the 1980s, his work has surfaced latent ideologies of popular culture, confronting issues of structural racism, power, visibility, and the defiant pleasures still found under capitalism. Cokes samples and remixes fragments of our media landscape to subvert its governing codes. His tightly choreographed video essays layer found text over vibrant colors and dissonant soundtracks,

exploiting the gaps between sensory regimes to heighten and complicate the reading experience. Quoted passages from current events or critical theory take on a new tenor when set to music, resulting in propulsive animations that appeal to the mind and body alike. Cokes' immersive works make text feel visceral and let rhythm spur new insight. His art attests, "it is possible to dance and think at the same time."

### Cassi Namoda

Cassi Namoda's (b. 1988, Maputo, Mozambique) work explores the history and culture of post-colonial Africa, especially the exchange between vernacular traditions and Portuguese colonialism in the Lusophone continent. Curated by ICA Executive Director Jessica Bell Brown, Namoda's exhibition of paintings and video works from the past five years to the present will be the first solo museum presentation of the artist's work in the United States.

Namoda's syncretic paintings are woven from a capacious symbolic language—she references global mythologies, indigenous folk art, European painting traditions, colonial power systems, and more in her dreamlike narratives and sensual landscapes. Characters and motifs (conjoined twins, fierce suns) recur within these intimate tableaux, often bolstered by references to literary, cinematic, and architectural aesthetics. Washed colors, bold compositions, and flat perspective further the paintings' aura of magical realism. The result is often a sense of romance and saudade injected into modernity and the art historical canon. Her work is represented in several international collections and museums.

Centered on the idea of pastiche as a strategy for bringing together a wide range of cultural reference points and narratives, the exhibition will parse the forward edges of the artist's interests in postcoloniality, magical realism, design, and world-building through a lusotropical and Global South lens.

### **Diane Severin Nguyen**

Diane Severin Nguyen (b. 1990, Carson City, California) works across photography, video, and installation, approaching the photographic moment as one of transformation. Curated by ICA Assistant Curator Egbert Vongmalaithong, Nguyen's exhibition will explore the artist's current trajectory, which considers histories of victimhood, propaganda, and sentimentality through popular forms of media and image-making. Nguyen will stage a theatrical and sonic performance alongside a presentation of a newly commissioned installation, with selections from her genre-defying films.

Moving beyond documentation, she engages photography as a moment of tension, shaped by desire, speculation, and material instability. Her video work extends these concerns, examining power, victimhood, and propaganda as forces that shape both cultural and self image. Nguyen's practice has been described as a "commitment to transience" with subjects that, though grotesque and painful, are also beautiful—like a pupa taking on the new shape and biology of a moth. Nguyen has exhibited her work internationally and lives and works in New York.
